The 2024 Tauranga Representative programme was a real success this year with the implementation of our registrations with NZ Mixed and Mens where we entered for the first time an Opens Mixed team, Opens Mens team and U20 Mens team into their respective national tournaments. Placings for this year included Open Mixed 5th in C grade, Opens Men 3rd in Reserve 2, U20 Mens 3rd in U20s grade, Opens Women's 6th at the open's nationals, U18 Women's placed 18th, U10 Men placed 3rd, 16A placed 10th in A grade, 16B 11th in B grade, 14A placing 6th in A grade, 14B placed 5th in B grade. A big thank you to our representative director Deborah Fuller who is a fantastic mentor to both our coaches and players. Thank you to our representative coaches who commit to ongoing development on their coaching pathway and give so much of their time and to the managers who take on the important role of keeping parents, players and the centre informed as we navigate through a short but robust representative season.

Aims saw a record amount of team entries with 140 registrations in 2024. Our teams did an amazing job over what is really a full-on week. Thank you to all our organisers and umpires who make this week a real success time and time again. Learning happens every year which keeps us continually reviewing, adapting, and improving.

Thank you to my support team at the centre Tania, Paula and Maree. It is difficult for organisations to have employees who are so invested and put every effort into providing a great experience for everyone. I love the collaborative relationship we have formed and am always excited with the thinking that eventuate into actual

good ideas! I am sure the girls will agree we have all formed some great connections with many in the community and we are very lucky to have that opportunity.

A big focus for us in 2025 as a community will be to minimise negative side line behaviour. Although only created by the minority it speaks volumes and is a hinderance to the culture we want to exhibit. Tauranga Netball will be reviewing our regulations and complaint procedures prior to the new season with substantial changes to consequences issued. I ask that our community reflect and think about why they are at netball watching their Tamariki and rangatahi and from there reflect on any behaviours that may impact a young persons experience. I am confident we are all supportive of a safe and happy environment for our young people and will support this Kaupapa.

Wishing each of you a safe and amazing summer filled with fun and laughter. Looking forward to seeing you all back in 2025 to play and participate in the game we love.

Umpire Lead Report 2024

2024 has come to a close, marking the end of another fantastic season and my first year employed as Umpire Lead. It felt surreal to transition from volunteering to this full-time role. I entered the season with grand ideas of transforming everything in a single year, but soon realised how much work truly goes into organising and allocating umpires for all of our competitions and tournaments, running workshops and rep programmes for umpires, finding replacement Umpires, trying to contact Umpires and addressing the myriad of queries I received via email, phone, and in person.

As the season wrapped up, I initially thought I had not accomplished much; some of my ambitious plans didn't go ahead as hoped. However, while putting together a "thank you and celebration" video for our umpires—an effort that took longer than expected due to the many successes we had—I recognised that I had indeed made progress. The changes may have been small, but they were meaningful, and I achieved several of my goals.

At the start of the season, we implemented a new edition of the Netball Rules and held multiple workshops covering 12 key rule changes, though we hoped for more participation from our Centre's members. These workshops sparked valuable discussions, clarifying the rules for the 2024 competitions. This year was a key learning experience, encouraging everyone to adopt the new rules while promoting sportsmanship, player responsibility, and safety. It's been an interesting season trying to get players to realise they must focus on "contesting" the ball cleanly, if they can't intercept or deflect the ball without contact, they should pull out to avoid more serious game management consequences, which unfortunately happened a lot at the start of our competitions.

Our netball season started early this year, with the Senior competition kicking off in March on Wednesdays. This allowed us to enjoy the warmer weather and finish the competition sooner, so players could support their tamariki in the College and Futureferns netball competitions later in the season.

We focused on developing umpires within our clubs and teams to ensure the sustainability of the Senior competition. Relying solely on secondary school-aged umpires is not viable, as they often move on to universities, and our older umpires are beginning to transition out. It was great to see many new umpires on the courts, but it's important for teams and players to understand that developing officiating skills takes time - Disputing calls or expressing frustration at Umpires is not acceptable.

A big thank you to all umpires who contributed to the competition. We appreciate our clubs for supporting the new regulation to supply more umpires for the competition to create a bigger pool of Umpire to allocate to their games. Thank you for your understanding and patience as we communicated this concept to your members. This extra support proved invaluable, especially during weeks when up to 15 umpires were unavailable due to injuries or other commitments. Despite the challenges, we managed to cover all games each week.

This year, we were pleased to have a few more qualified Zone and NZ Umpires for our Open Premier Competition. Each umpire officiating on Thursday nights is on the "Umpires Pathway", working hard to improve their skills and manage our elite competition. Thanks to our Umpire Coaches, who consistently provide guidance, we are seeing ongoing improvements in our Umpires' performances, our Umpire Coaches have helped Umpires set goals and identify areas for development, leading to better officiating. Thank you to all the umpires for their commitment to umpiring our Open Premier competition, who come not only from Tauranga and its surrounds, but also from other Centres in our Zone, your support of this competition is very much appreciated.

This season, our College competition games required the addition of another round to fit them all in. With fewer Premier Competition grades, I was able to allocate umpires to Premier 1 and 2 matches, as well as to the Premier 3 and 4 grades. Thanks to our new coaching board upstairs, Umpire Coaches could easily identify umpires needing support on Friday nights. This resulted in several umpires achieving their NZ Centre Award during the competition. We now have a strong group of qualified umpires from the Colleges, along with several "Learning to Umpire" participants, which allowed me to confidently allocate capable umpires to Semi and Final games this season. While this caused some initial confusion to start with, our teams appreciated having neutral Umpires on these important games.

Saturdays are devoted to our Intermediate, Years 5 and 6, and Years 1 to 4 games as part of the FutureFern competitions. It's a long day, with the last round finishing just before 4pm. For those of us who rise early to set up the courts and get the kitchen going for the food and the coffee brewing, the day may start early, but it's incredibly rewarding to see our young netballers enjoying themselves and learning the game we love.

This season, I launched a program for umpires from the FFW Learn to Umpire Workshops to focus exclusively on officiating Year 5 games. This allowed them to learn the rules alongside the Year 5 players improving their netball skills. Before each match, we ran short skill sessions to refresh the Umpires understanding of the rules. It was inspiring to see their growth, especially a mother-daughter duo learning together. By season's end, they became confident whistle-blowers and made solid calls.

Congratulations to our newbie Umpires who officiated in the Year 5 and 6 competitions, you all improved significantly and achieved the basic skill sets required to umpire your level of the games and were awarded your FFW and LTU Certificates. I hope to see you all continue to enjoy umpiring at our Centre.

Christine Healey, our Centre Umpire Coach Lead, wants to extend our gratitude to the Centre Umpire Coaching Panel for their dedicated efforts each Saturday. She has a committed group of ladies who show up weekly to support and develop our umpires working towards their NZ Centre Award. They also support the Year 6 competition umpires as well as our Year 5 beginner umpires who are honing the skills necessary for their "LTU" and "FFW" Umpire Certificates.

Christine, our Centre Coach Lead, also expresses a desire to see more adults step up to learn how to umpire. We encourage the adults on the sidelines supporting their children to consider picking up a whistle and joining in on the officiating journey. It is a wonderful opportunity to engage with your child's experience as they play.

Christine says "If you are a player, coach, or spectator at our Centre and want to learn a new skill, picking up a whistle is not as daunting as it may seem. We offer fantastic workshops to help you understand the rules of netball, and our skilled Umpire Coaches are here to support you in developing your ability to officiate games effectively".

Congratulations to all our umpires progressing along the NNZ pathway who have successfully achieved their NZ Centre Award, NZ Zone Award, and NZ C and B Awards on our Premier, Senior, College and Intermediate competitions! Your hard work and dedication have truly shone through this season, with achievements in both your practical assessments and theory exams. Our Umpire Coaches have thoroughly enjoyed supporting your development, from the foundation skills at Centre level to the more complex rule applications required at the NZ level. Witnessing the growth and determination of each of you has been inspiring. Keep up the fantastic work!

This report highlights the remarkable achievements of our umpires this season. While we have too many qualified umpires to mention individually, a full list of their accomplishments can be found at the end of this report, I do need to mention a few.

We proudly gained another 2 NZ C Qualified Umpires from our Umpires Group, congratulations Siobhan McFadyen and Renee Smit. Both young umpires have worked diligently with the NZ Umpire Coaching Panel, demonstrating impressive skills in our Open Premier Competition games.

At the North Island Junior Netball Championship in Taranaki, we celebrated Victoria Geck's appointment to the Under 16B grade final. Congratulations, Victoria, on this well-deserved recognition!

Additionally, four of our umpires—Joanie Coles, Renee Smit, Poppy Plank, and Siobhan McFadyen—were selected to referee the finals at the WaiBOP Zone Secondary School Tournament in Hamilton. Well done to all of you for representing our Centre with your skills!

At UNISS, Umpires from our Centre featured in each grade's finals and playoffs – Joanie Coles, Reserve for the A Grade Final, and also umpired the A Grade 3 v 4 playoff. Renee Smit umpired the B Grade Final and Siobhan McFadyen w umpired the C Grade Final. Congratulations to you all for being recognised for your skills by the Umpire Coaches at this tournament, we were very proud to see you achieve the games you were selected to umpire!

Connor Pascoe received selection by NNZ to umpire at the NetballSmart Netball NZ Open Championships in Auckland. He showcased his considerable talent by officiating in the Semi-Finals and was appointed to the playoff for 3rd and 4th place. We are incredibly proud of Connor for representing us so well throughout the tournament.

At the Men's National Tournament held in Tauranga in September, our umpires made a significant impact, being selected to officiate in the final games for each grade. Connor and Keni umpired the A grade final, Joanie Coles umpired the B grade final, Renee Smit umpired the Under 20 grade, and Siobhan McFadyen umpired the Reserve grade final. Congratulations to each of you for earning this recognition!

Keni King had an outstanding season, earning double honours in his umpiring selections. At the NZ Under 18 Championships in Dunedin, he was appointed to officiate the Under 18 Women's final—this marked a first for both him and our Tauranga Netball Centre. Keni then went on to officiate at the NZ Secondary Schools Tournament, where he again demonstrated his talent by being appointed to the final. To top off his exceptional year, Keni was awarded his NZ B Umpire qualification at the NZ Secondary School Tournament, a well-earned recognition of his hard work and growth over the past few years. Congratulations, Keni!

Rose Powdrell our NZ Umpire Coach Lead was very proud of these Umpires and their achievements, commenting "that this group of Umpires have had an outstanding season. They have been rewarded with appointments at tournaments which acknowledges the time and effort they have given to the sport of umpiring and the immense growth they have made within their sprot through the season".

Rose also observed that "our season has had some amazing highs by our umpires. As the Umpires Coaches we celebrate these achievements with them and remember that we all have a part to play in their road to success and there will be many more coaches who contribute to the future successes also". We must recognise Rose's significant contributions to the success and growth of our NZ umpires as well! Her dedication, friendship, mentorship, and extensive knowledge of the game have undoubtedly helped our NZ umpires achieve the successes they have achieved this season.

Rose would also like to recognise our Umpires who attended the Zespri AIMS Games, "It is fantastic to have so many of the local umpires support this awesome event. The support that we receive from the local Colleges to allow students to have a week of school for this event is greatly appreciated. It is an opportunity for developing umpires to have a taste of their first major tournament. The opportunity to be coached by different but experienced umpire coaches from other areas, the growth which umpires make through the week is amazing".

Congratulations to our umpires who received our TNC Umpire trophies this season! Connor Pascoe and Keni Kingi shared the Supreme Umpire of the Year award, Siobhan McFadyen received the TNC Promising Umpire of the Year, and Lisa Cooper was recognised as the TNC Emerging Umpire of the Year. Each of you has demonstrated tremendous growth in your umpiring skills. Well done on an outstanding year of officiating!

What a fantastic year it has been for our umpires! We have seen a record number of new qualifications achieved and many of our talented officials recognised for their hard work. A heartfelt thank you goes out to all the umpires at our Centre—you are the backbone of our competitions, your skills and dedication are essential to the smooth operation of our many games, and we simply could not operate without you!

Pre-Season: Had set up pre training going into the season, this was not successful as only a handful of players showed up (including 2 U18 Men Team).

Trials: The second year we have, had low numbers in trials. At this time of the season, players are engaged in other sports and take this over even coming to trials. The players that came to trials were very good and we were lucky to have them show up.

We picked 12 players and 2 non-travelling/3 training partners. After the players were selected, they were given a folder with everything that they will need for the season, we had a meeting where we wrote up our Values and expectations both from the Players and Management.

The non-travelling player/training partner's, this was always and has been what I have needed in case of injury. The non-travelling players we had 1 player turn up each week until she quit School Netball and then stopped playing netball all together. The other non-travelling player came a couple of times but was very injured and did not train. The Training partners were invited each week, 1 player showed up 4 times (defender) 2 weeks before we were ready to go to Dunedin, one of our shooters badly sprained her ankle and we were lucky enough to have a training Partner who was a shooter. (She Played U16a TNC team) This is why we need to have players waiting in the wings in case of injury.

In Season: This year we were very lucky to have this season S&C trainer for fitness, and having a pool session helped with recovery, Psychologist to take us through how to deal with things that may happen in a game, Paula to take us through the warmup. Our theme was Army, and we were lucky enough to have a sergeant from the NZ Army come and take a session before going to Nationals. These are a critical part of the campaign, building the skills (physical and mental) of our players and making sure they have the right skills to go into Nationals.

We also had access to a senior Women's team which we trained with and played against twice.

Fitness was very important this year. We had set out the training on a Saturday, knowing that the girls would play on a Friday night, tournament on Sundays and fitness on a Monday – this all came into fruition because we were still fit enough for the last game of the Nationals. This was great for us to measure the success of the fitness of the players but that playing and training for 4 days in a row really helped us in the campaign.

Though I would of preferred to have a court to ourselves, we trained half court with the U18 Men (having half each) the bonus for this was that we could have a game at the end of training to put all together what we had trained.

We had a lot of injuries this season but having Ang (manager) keep up to date with physio's, players and being there for each player really helped through the season.

Tournaments: were in Auckland, Rotorua, Tauranga & Hamilton. These tournaments are there for us to build our team, especially getting combinations, but more than that who can step up to the task at this level. We found some solid players when playing these **fournaments** and we could see that we would be able to foot it with the big teams.

Nationals: Every year our players get to travel around the country, which is at great cost to TNC and we appreciate this so much, the organizing of each campaign takes a lot. Our accommodation worked for what we were doing (playing netball), the socializing of the team's was nice to see, kai worked well, the interaction with the TNC management was great, the food that was provided was again great (Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner)

Games: We started well in the tournament but dropping even 1 game puts you in a venerable position of do or die. We fought well in all games, but when the heat went on, especially in our attack end we really struggled with our mental side.

What an awesome experience Coaching this men's team, and we finished 3 in our grade at Nationals.

Trials were in June, we didn't have many show up (Over 20 registered), 16 attended. Maybe this was because, this was the first time TNC Netball Center has ever had a Men's team going to Nationals. We called the Men's team the "Legacy Team" being the first.

The Men that showed up were at different levels of playing, some had played for years, some for months and some were coming back into the Game being away for years. We didn't have enough players that were at a very high level and training had to be dedicated to fitness, foundational skills and it was really hard to get them all to the same level, but with saying that we had a really good team spirit and trainings were fun, engaging, and everyone contributed to training and any conversation.



The Tauranga Mixed Netball team embarked on a remarkable journey as they prepared for their debut at the national mixed netball tournament. With the decision to participate made at the last minute, the team faced the challenge of coming together quickly to ensure they could perform at their best on a national stage. Our goal was clear: to excel not only in the tournament but in everything leading up to it, including each training session, preparation effort, and game plan execution.

We (as a team) began by focusing on building effective combinations on the court. Given that players came from various backgrounds and experience levels, our initial trainings emphasised understanding each other's strengths and playing styles. Position rotations during these sessions helped us identify which combinations worked best for attacking, defending, and transitioning between plays. This practice allowed the team to recognise who played well together and where adjustments could maximise our effectiveness as a collective. Despite being new to nationals, our preparation and team cohesion helped us rise to the occasion, and we played with confidence and unity. By consistently pushing ourselves to work together and adapt under pressure, we achieved our goal of performing well at each stage, showing resilience and determination both as individuals and as a team.



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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF TAURANGA NETBALL CENTRE INCORPORATED

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Tauranga Netball Centre Incorporated ("the Incorporation), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 September 2024 and the statement of financial performance for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying special purpose financial statements of the Incorporation for the year ended 30 September 2024 are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies specified in Note 1 to the financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Control over cash-based revenue streams

Included in the statement of profit or loss for the year ended 30 September 2024 is revenue from canteen sales of \$163,048. Controls over certain cash-based revenue streams prior to being recorded is limited. Consequently, there were no practical audit procedures we could perform to confirm independently that all cash revenue items were properly recorded. Accordingly, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments should be made to the reported amounts for this revenue stream

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) ("ISAs (NZ)"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Incorporation in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion.

Other than in our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, the Incorporation.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution and Use

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared solely for the Incorporation's members, as a body. As a result, the financial statements may not be suitable for another purpose. Our report is intended solely for the Incorporation and the Incorporation's members, as a body, and should not be distributed to or used by parties other than the Incorporation or the Incorporation's members. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

 misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
